George Joseph Rusciano Memorial

Marion E. Breland, Director of the Haverstraw Center for Youth and Family Services was pleasantly surprised and very pleased with the presentation of the George Joseph Rusciano Memorial plaque. The Haverstraw Center staff wanted to do something special to honor the great work that Marion's father did in this community he called home for so many years.

The memorial will honor a student in his or her junior year of high school who exemplifies the wonderful traits Mr. Rusciano exhibited: perseverance and achievement.

Attending NYU part-time, it took twelve years for Mr. Rusciano to graduate while working full-time to support his parents and family. An immigrant, Mr. Rusciano came to the United States with nothing but the clothes on his back. He had to learn to speak English and acclimate himself to the hustle and bustle of the big city.

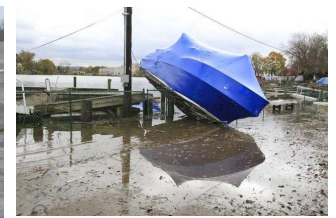
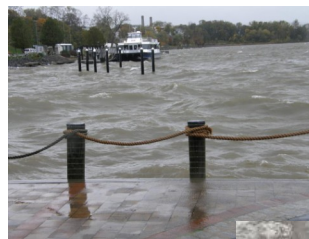
With a command for the language, a college degree and a supportive family, Mr. Rusciano was able to finally establish himself in an industry where his skills were widely needed. As an architect at a time when the country was seeing strip

malls and shopping taking on a shape of its own, Mr. Rusciano was widely sought for his ideas and visions. He designed Haverstraw Town Hall, St. Paul's Church in Congers, Sons of Jacob in Haverstraw, plus buildings all over the tri-state area, the country and internationally. Those he employed became like family to him and those who supported him in his struggle to the top were never forgotten.

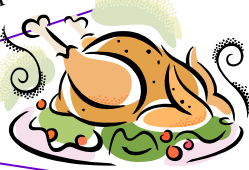

MONTHLY YOUTH CELEBRATION "Caught Being Good"

The Monthly Youth Celebration took place on Tuesday October 23rd. This event includes recognition of those youth who have been "Caught Being Good" at the Haverstraw Center as well as birthdays celebrated in October. Frankie Vazquez cooked a tasty pot of chili served over rice which was enjoyed by all. Youth volunteers helped to serve and clean up. Open Arms sent volunteers to help set up.

This month's celebration focused on the theme of "The Best Me is Drug Free" as recognition of **Red Ribbon Week** continued. Posters created by many of the youth who participate in a variety of clubs decorated the walls. The message is clear and many signed pledges to remain drug-free. Fun Red Ribbon activity sheets with a healthy choices maze, word search and puzzle were also completed as the youth gathered.

In addition, the youth signed a sympathy card expressing their condolences to Director Marion Breland to be delivered at the memorial service for her father, George J. Rusciano. (See story on pages 1 & 3.)

Each time a youth is nominated for "Caught Being Good", his/her name is placed in the hat for a drawing of prizes. Most months the prizes are \$10.00 gift certificates to McDonald's in hopes that the youth will make healthy choices when they redeem their prize. Sometimes the prize is a donation from a local business and some months the Town of Haverstraw makes a generous donation of tickets to one of their Youth Board sponsored trips.

Pumpkin Fettuccine Alfredo

A rich and creamy Alfredo sauce with a subtle flavor of pumpkin make this a delightful dish for a quick and easy addition to your Thanksgiving menu. Use fresh fettuccine or a good quality dried egg fettuccine. Feel free to toss some toasted, chopped walnuts or crushed amaretti cookies on top.

- 12 ounces fettuccine
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1 cup canned solid pack pumpkin puree
- 2 cups heavy cream
- Freshly ground nutmeg
- Slat and pepper
- 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 4-5 fresh sage leaves, chopped
- Additional parmesan cheese for serving

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over medium-high heat. Cook the pasta according to package directions.

Melt the butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the onion; sauté for 2-3 minutes, stirring until softened. Add the pumpkin, heavy cream, parmesan cheese, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer for 5 minutes, stirring frequently, until the sauce is slightly thickened.

Drain the pasta and add to the sauce. Transfer the pasta to a serving bowl. Sprinkle with fresh sage and additional grated parmesan cheese.

September 3, 1914 George Joseph Rusciano October 12, 2012

George Joseph Rusciano of Leonia, NJ, formerly of Haverstraw, NY died on October 12, 2012. Beloved father of Haverstraw Center Director, Marion E. Breland, Mr. Rusciano was 98 years old. He enjoyed telling stories of his early years in Bronx, NY, roaming fields, being taken to school by stagecoach, reading books in his treehouse, playing baseball with his numerous cousins and brothers, and enjoying his mother’s incredible cooking.

He was a graduate of NYU with a Bachelor’s degree in architecture, attending as a part-time student for twelve years while working full-time to support his parents and family. During

WWII, George served his country as a naval architect at Gibbs and Cox, and it was there that he met his first wife, Marion Gallagher. They were married in 1944, and in 1956 moved to Rockland County where they raised their three children. In 1978, he married Catherine Hayes and moved to New Jersey where he lived for the remainder of his life. George was a prominent architect designing buildings not only locally, but all over the country as well as internationally, including hotels in Curacao and Puerto Rico. Some of his more well-known local designs include St. Paul’s Church in Congers, the David B. Roche firehouse, and serving as the local architect

for the renovation of the Rockland County Jail. He was especially proud to be chosen to design the Haverstraw Town Hall because of his great love for his “adopted” community. George was a founding member of the David B. Roche Volunteer Fire Company, and served on the Haverstraw Planning Board for several years.

George is survived by his three daughters, Marion Breland of Nyack, Kathleen and her husband Harold Jaffe of Wayne, NJ and Susan Rusciano of River Edge, NJ; by his sisters-in-law Dorothy DiRoma, Jeane Mabusth, Mary Rusciano, and Anne Hayes. He will be deeply missed by his grandchildren Dylan Rupp, Cassidy Rupp, Jonathan Breland, Carole Breland and Mia Oswald, his cousin Kurt and his son-in-law Prentiss.
